

Water: deliver high quality water every day to 2.7 million people


Power: generate clean hydropower and solar power

Wastewater: protect public health and the environment



Retail Conservation Program

- Robust & evolving since 1990s; includes incentives, assistance, tools, education, & mandates
- Based on best practices, studies, local conditions
- Operates rain or shine, expanded efforts during drought
- Led to water use decline despite population growth
- Indoor/outdoor R-GPCD = 41 gallons






Voluntary Assistance Programs

- Free water-wise evaluations and water-saving devices
- Free residential toilet replacement
- Rebates for clothes washers, hot water recirculation pumps, large commercial equipment, rain barrels and cisterns
- Grants for onsite reuse and large landscape retrofits
- Training, outreach, educational materials
- Leak, high use, water waste alerts and water use platform












Highlights from 2009 – 2022



- 2 Tracking of participation in measure started later than 2009
- 3 Landscape includes Water Efficient Irrigation Ordinance projects, landscape audits, community irrigation grants and rebates
- 4 Includes ice machines, industrial dishwashers, sterilization equipment
- 5 Does not include calls to the SFPUC's General Call Center regarding conservation



- Water waste restrictions i.e. no outdoor runoff
- Water efficient landscape ordinance for new and retrofitted landscapes
- Submetering requirements for new multi-family housing
- Onsite reuse ordinance for large new developments
- Plumbing fixture retrofit ordinances for existing residential and commercial properties



San Francisco Residential Water Conservation Ordinance

- San Francisco's Residential Energy Conservation Ordinance included water measures until 1991
- In 1991, separate water conservation ordinance was established, updated in 2009 (SF Housing Code Ch 12A)
- Requires residential properties replace old plumbing fixtures to meet current standards:
 - Toilets over 1.6 gpf must be replaced with 1.28 gpf
 - Showerheads over 2.5 gpm must be replaced with 1.8 gpm
 - Faucet aerators over 2.2 gpm must be replaced with 0.5 gpm
 - Leaks must be repaired
- Required upon resale & major improvements
- Administered by SF Department of Building Inspection



Residential Conservation Ordinance Compliance Process

- Obtain inspection from DBI's Housing Inspection Services (HIS) or DBI-approved private inspector
- File inspection form with HIS within 15 days
- Make required retrofits and obtain compliance certification from HIS
- Record final form with Assessor's Office
- Exemptions for transfers due to operation of law, not purchase – probate sale, trust, default
- Retrofits can be transferred to buyer if seller/buyer agree and done through escrow



Challenges

- Estimating compliance as % of all residential properties and total sold is difficult
 - Don't know total quantity of existing multi-family condos that could sell separately from multi-family buildings
 - Realtor data on properties sold annually higher than DBI data on compliance inspections conducted
- Have encountered some properties sold with old fixtures and no inspections, not sure reasons
 - All cash sales, properties slated for complete retrofit by buyer
- Don't track or enforce final compliance step of recordation with SF Assessor's Office
- Would benefit from more outreach to realtors



Programs & Mandates Led to High Saturation of Efficient Fixtures

Toilets		85%	88%	90%	92%
Showerheads		83%	91%	95%	98%
Clothes Washers		75%	85%	90%	94%
